
English

We are thankful to God for the growth of our English congregations in numbers and in spiritual maturity in 2023.

We saw our congregations grow back numerically to pre-pandemic levels with an average attendance of 750 people in English congregations. However, we also note that there was an average of 436 people who followed our 9am Liturgical service online each week. They are not counted in our attendance but we pray, do benefit from the ministry.





We continued to evangelise through personal evangelism. We ran Christianity Explored and Hope Explored online and some of our growth groups ran their own Guest Many newcomers attended our evangelistic 9 Lessons and Carols service. We continued to see people meet Christ through coming to church and hearing the Gospel.

Our **establishing** processes continued as God brought in people - 30 people were formally followed up on a one-to-one basis using Just for Starters, although there would have been more who did it informally. We thank God for the 19 adults and 7 children who were baptised in our English congregations and the 50 people who were confirmed. We ran "Belonging" in March and August as an orientation program to help 56 newcomers get settled in our church.

Our Sunday services remain the hub of our nurturing process with Gospelcentred expository preaching, Christglorifying singing, intercessory prayer, the Lord's Supper, and Biblical Anglican liturgy - both formally at liturgical services and relatively informally at SMACC. We are thankful for the many individuals and teams who serve to enable these to happen and above all for the transforming work of God's Spirit through His Word. A Question-and-Answer time was added in the SMACC services to enable people to seek clarification on matters that were raised in the sermon, and this was generally well received. We also held an ethics forum following the 10 commandments series to help people apply them.



We are thankful for the growth of our small groups' ministry. However, Growth Groups penetration is much smaller in our Liturgical congregations, and this is a matter for prayer and effort for 2024. We also had a great camp – SMAGLOW where 321 people from across the English congregations gathered around God's Word in a time of great fellowship with one another.

We sought to **train** people in our congregation in the Bible, theology, and ministry skills over the course of the year. Our online Tuesday Night Training did some of that, but there were also specific trainings to raise up new Growth Group Leaders, Lay Readers, Pre-Marital Counsellors, and other ministers. 20 of our Young Adults were trained for word ministry with KVBC NextGen.

More than 50 people attended a seminar in Biblical Theology which was run over 2 weekends. We also continued to train apprentices and theological students for future ministry in our MTS and MTS Plus programs.

Our people continued to **serve** Christ within the Cathedral and in the world. Many did 'Ministry of the Pew' each week and continued to help make disciples of their peers at church, in small groups and in one-to-one ministry. Much ministry was informal as people spoke the truth of God's Word and displayed God's love to one another and to others. There was also much formal ministry. Many served in auxiliary bodies and ministries including Kids church, CWF, Golden Circle, Agape Refugee School and Social Concerns. Much effort was put into reviving both our University and Colleges Fellowship (UCF) and our Youth Fellowship to good effect. Others served in formal Sunday ministries like Welcoming, Music, Logistics, Bible Reading, Prayer, Refreshments etc. Others worked hard to maintain and improve the Trellis in various ways for the sake of the Vine. Several of our people also served the Lord in the wider Diocese and in extra-denominational ministries to support the wider church. We continued to financially support the wider Cathedral including her missionaries.







Rev Gordon Kong retired from the pastoral team in 2023 after many years of faithful service. He remains an active member of the congregation and continues to help lead services from time to time when his presence is especially needed. Stephanie Ong and Daniel Woon joined our staff team, primarily to oversee the Children's Ministry and the Youth Ministry respectively, although their ministries are broader than that. We are thankful to God for all of them.



By God's grace, the SMACC1 congregation has outgrown the Multi-Purpose Hall and needs to mitose if it is to faithfully continue the mission of bringing new people to Christ and growing them to maturity in Him. In 2024, we plan therefore, God willing, for SMACC1 to develop into 2 new congregations to enable the work of making disciples of Jesus Christ to continue to expand though that ministry. One of those congregations will meet in a different site.

Please pray that this will happen, and that these congregations will flourish and reproduce in due course. Our prayer is that God would be pleased to bless us with small groups and congregations that grow in faith and love, which multiply to form new small groups and congregations that do the same, as the Gospel of Christ crucified and risen goes forth from among them, and the Spirit does His work to the glory of God the Father.





Playing a part in the body of Christ towards Maturity in Him

Have you noticed the connect cards at services, and wonder if people fill them out or are they just merely recycled at every service?

However, without it, we would not have met people like Menaka, who five years ago would not have imagined that she would one day be a baptised Christian and attending church.

Even though she had been introduced to Christianity when she was younger, it wasn't until about two years ago when she began to rediscover the Christian faith while being part of a Christian friend's wedding. This brought her to a service at St Mary's, where she filled out a connect card and began a Just For Starter's course not long after.



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My mentor, Mary, brought me through and explained Bible verses to me. She continued to support me and through her, I joined a GG who is always there to support me as a friend, as a family in Christ and also to grow my faith.

Today, she has been baptised, regularly studies the Word of God with a Growth Group which has been faithfully praying alongside her and providing emotional and social support through her ups and downs.

"When I study the Bible by myself, I don't interpret the meaning as we would in the GG discussions. It's a deep study - even in one verse, there are a lot of things that we can learn. It's not just any book you can just read and understand. The GG is helping me to understand the biblical context and the Word of God better," Menaka said.



Servant-leadership and growth

Group Menaka's Growth leader, Kenneth Ho, first visited St Mary's for a seminar in December 2018, when he was looking for a new church to be plugged into. He spoke to various church leaders as he decided on a church to commit to, and was impressed by the centrality Scriptures in the conversations he had at St Mary's. In January 2020, just before the Covid-19 pandemic, he began officially attending services at St Mary's.

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But what sealed the deal for me in deciding to come over was not the resources or connections that St Mary's had or how much I fit in with the crowd but how servant-leadership was exemplified in the leaders of the church.

Since then, Kenneth has served in various capacities, and found that he took great joy in learning and teaching. He now serves as a Growth Group leader for SMACC1, and has witnessed people growing more and more in the Word of God.

"As Christians who profess God's truth to be the standard we live by, growing in conformity to His Son as we know from Scripture is the direction we need to take. The Scripture-centred culture preaching, teaching of the conversations that happen in St Mary's has borne fruit; one conversation I fondly remember was with a particular member whom I have followed up with for some time and have seen that person grow from asking "What do I think about this?" to "What does the Bible say about this?"





"I cannot take credit for any of that growth as it was God working through His Spirit and His people in shaping that person and I thank God that isn't an isolated case here. I am also encouraged by those who previously were unsure of their ability to lead others to Christ who have now taken on journeying with them in their own capacity."

A scriptural foundation in every aspect

Adherence to Scripture at St Mary's extends beyond studying the Bible - it permeates every part of our church. Have you ever sat in a Liturgical service and wondered how the music all comes together? That would be the of Christine Raiaratnam. work Influenced by her mother who was a pipe organist for St Mary's, Christine plays a pivotal role as the music coordinator for the Liturgical services. She works with the pastoral team to carefully curate the music at each service and ensures that the hymn not only complements the sermon, but points towards Christ and God's character.



Every lyric must always point to God's Word to God's glory.



When you come into church, you want to be able to sing something that is welcoming, inviting you into the fellowship and then as you leave church also, I think it's important that you sing something that is joyful and encouraging. So we try to make the first and the last one a bit more familiar. And then during communion, that's the time we sing hymns that are meditative. That's the time people will be able to reflect on the message."

Having attended St Mary's for the last 56 years, Christine has been through various phases of her life with members of the congregation whom she views as her extended family. "There has been a lot of support in those who know me, who have been walking alongside me. Knowing that you have people who are walking alongside you makes it a joy to serve."

Besides serving in the music ministry, Christine is also part of an informal counselling ministry, providing premarital counselling to couples preparing for marriage. Being a cancer patient herself, she also walks alongside some members of the church who are going through cancer.



Nurturing the next generation in the Word

"We actually came to St Mary's because the boys loved the Kids' Church," Austin and Ashton's mother, Anne, says. The boys, now 12, were introduced to St Mary's Kids' Church during the Covid-19 pandemic, just as they were beginning to feel like they were outgrowing the Sunday school at the church they used to attend. When physical meetings returned after the pandemic, the boys and their family made the decision to move to St Mary's so the children would be able to attend Kids' Church.

"We read the Bible on a daily basis and we do devotions every day. Kids' Church goes more into detail about the stuff," the boys say.

Anne says attending Kids' Church has deepened their understanding of the Word, such that they are able to contribute to discussions when they follow their parents to GG meetings and during devotions at home.



It's quite fun for the adults because they are like, "oh we know about this, we've learned it at Kids' Church already, we know which passage you are talking about," Anne says.

BM (Pelayanan Bahasa Malaysia)

The BM ministry began in July 1996, marking its 27th anniversary in 2023. Our members are mostly East Malaysians who have come to the Peninsular to study or work either in the private sector or the government, West Malaysians whose spouses are East Malaysians, and some Indonesians.

As a result, our membership is transient. As soon as their studies are completed, they will return home or move to another state for work, and this applies to working adults too who will be transferred from Klang Valley after three to five years of work.

Our ministry focus is to reach BM-speaking Christians, especially those who are vulnerable to converting to another faith. With this challenge in mind, our focal point is on discipleship in every area of our ministry. We train the next generation of leaders in every age group; our young adults and teens meet every Saturday and Sunday respectively to study the Bible together; and we participate in courses offered by the Anglican Institute of Ministry (A.I.M) and Equip Gospel Ministries.





Our main event of the year is the annual Bible camp.

Each year we concentrate on a different theological theme, including issues about Christian living, and apologetics, or the New Testament epistles. This event attracts ninety percent of our congregation who will spend the weekend away together. Last year, we held our camp at Golden Sands Baptist Assembly, Port Dickson. It was an event for all ages and interests: barbeque, singing, dancing, games, discussions, all of which are centred around God's Word and the theme of 'Christian Spiritual Battle' from Ephesians 6:10-18.

Other annual events include young adults, men and women (family) seminars.

We had two new starts in 2023. The first is an Outreach / Cell group in

Bentong, Pahang that meets monthly every first Saturday evening. This group aims to reach out to Sabahans and Sarawakians who are working there as prison and police personnel.

The second is a new 8.30am Sunday service in the Lady Chapel before our usual llam service.

We are also thankful to God for the first-time visitors in 2023, 24 of whom are now enrolled as members.

PBM Men and Women Ministry

There has been a consistent coming together of faithful men over the year as they sought to grow in God's Word as well as deepen their friendships with each other and across our congregation.

A seminar for fathers (Seminar Bapa-Bapa PBM) was the highlight of the year. A deeper dive into Christlike fatherhood took place through this seminar. These men not only took their own growth in Christ seriously, but they were also keen for the gospel to go out. They participated in a Guest Night organized by the youth.

It was especially encouraging to see how the men turned all their activities over to God through regular prayer meeting. In addition to this, a couple of friendship-building engagement activities took place outdoors, such as badminton. There was a chance for quieter fellowship in calm surroundings through a fishing outing. There's even evidence of fish caught!



Not only did they work strengthening fellowship amongst each other, these faithful brothers-in-Christ also served their congregation in several other ways. Every fourth Sunday of the month, they helped with the ministry to ushering welcome newcomers and help deepen ties amongst regulars. One of the crossministry initiatives was where the men's ministry assisted the women's ministry in organizing and serving refreshments after service on Sunday.

Additionally, the men's ministry served their sisters-in-Christ (wives and mothers) by organizing Mothers' Day celebrations. They ended the year by joining the carolling initiative and sang with cheer and hope about the birth of the Christ child and all it brings for humanity.

There was also a consistent effort made by these sisters-in-Christ to grow in their knowledge and love of Jesus through His Word. They especially worked on building hearts of service, and this was nurtured through a seminar entitled 'Ku kasihi kau, sisku sayau' (Loving each other as sisters-in-Christ). Women came together to consider the implications of 1 John 4:20-21, and to work out how loving God could be reflected in loving one another and others.

As they grew in Christ, they sought to grow in friendship with one another. They kept a look out for new faces in their congregation, without forgetting existing friendships amongst members of the congregation.

There was sterling participation in the BM AGAPE kitchen through elaborate lunch preparations for the Ilam congregation; four groups served the congregation once a month in this capacity. A Women's Day celebration and welcoming party was organized to welcome newcomers and celebrate regulars. Additionally, the women's ministry played a very active role in the Guest Night through their gifts of dance (performance of a Hawaiian dance). Their willingness to put their gift of dance to use was seen again in their display of the Borneo Traditional Dance performance during the Gawai Kaamatan Celebration.

All glory be to God for His faithfulness and how he has grown the men and women from this congregation in His Word throughout the year. It is exciting to see how God works in His people through their diversity. We pray for continued growth in Christ that is displayed in personal growth amongst individuals and acts of service towards their members as well as the wider church.

Shalom. When the world was brought to a halt by COVID-19 and our country by the implementation of the Movement Control Order (MCO), we couldn't gather as a congregation except via live stream. This greatly affected our attendance when we resumed in-person services as many were still afraid to gather.

So, at the end of 2022, I called the congregation to return to services in church through a unique ministry called Micro Ministry. This ministry includes Ministry of Police, Ministry of Army, Ministry of Nursing, Ministry of Fire, Ministry of Teachers, Ministry of Civil Servants and of Private Sector. I appointed leaders from each ministry as an agent to bring their respective members to church and utilised WhatsApp group as a channel to broadcast information related to church activities. We celebrated the anniversary of each ministry during our Sunday service.

Through these ministries, many more attended our services in 2023, including those who have never attended a church service before. When they learned about the gospel and what it means for their lives, they ask to be baptised. Many of them also bring their children to be baptised and join our congregation as members.



The heads of each ministry carry out pastoral care by leading cell groups in various congregation member's houses. At these meetings, they also invite their neighbours to come and enjoy fellowship together.

Further to these fellowship in the homes, our leaders also hold other social activities such sports, picnic by the river and BBQ. We found these activities to be very effective in establishing relationships and inviting non-Christians to church.

For the gospel to be passed on to the congregation, I teach our leaders, young and old, through Zoom. This is one of the many layers of preparation for the time to come.

Visiting and Caring for the Sick and Needy

When was the last time you visited someone in the hospital? Maybe it was comforting to know that the person you visited would recover soon and his illness would only be for a time. Perhaps you struggled to find the right words to say to a terminally ill patient. Maybe there were awkward moments and you felt you might have done better if only you had said the right words at the right time. You may even have questions such as, "Why is there so much pain in this world? How am I supposed to help and comfort this suffering patient and their loved ones?"

Rev John Layang, the pastor of our Iban congregation, said, "The hospital visitation ministry of our congregation began a few years ago when Rev Tim Nicholls, one of our former pastors, received a call from Institut Jantung Negara (IJN), Kuala Lumpur; a patient from Sarawak needed prayer and support.



So, Tim called me to come along, and we visited the patient and prayed for him. From that moment onwards, whenever there was a patient from Sarawak, I will be called to pay a visit." It is truly amazing how a flourishing ministry started with just a phone call. Very often, God uses the little things as stepping stones for great things.

Since then, the hospital visitation ministry is in communication with the Jabatan Kebajikan who will contact John and his congregation whenever there is a patient from Sarawak who needs support and prayer. This has enabled many patients from Sarawak to receive the support they need where otherwise their pleas would go unnoticed.

As this ministry can get very tiring and busy, John trains the lay leaders in his congregation to visit and pray for the patients they visit and delegates the work of this ministry to them. John would be accompanied by lay leaders from his congregation (and occasionally a person from our Social Concerns Group and other volunteers such as Linda Crocker and Roselina Sumin (John's wife)) to visit Sarawakian patients of all races in IJN and occasionally Hospital Kuala Lumpur (HKL).

Kathleen Nandong, one of our church members, has been helping John with sourcing, collection, distribution of food to the needy patients. Olivia Sue, another church member, has been helping with the sourcing of funds needed for this ministry. Financial donations mainly sourced from church members and from Sarawakians. John is also in partnership with Borneo Unite, an organisation that receives and uses funds from donors to buy basic provisions for needy patients.

Some of the patients that John is helping could only afford to bring RM 50 from Sarawak as that is all they have. As the admission fee to IJN can be high, John appeals to IJN and Rumah Sarawak to help with the subsidies of the patients' admission and stay in IJN.

Sadly, many patients that John and his team have visited have passed away. Although those patients have gone through much pain and suffering while they were alive, they felt so supported and loved by God and His people. This has opened opportunities to share the hope of Jesus Christ in their most vulnerable moment. Although death tears them away from us, it carries them into the arms of our Lord Jesus Christ.

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Most patients are poor, and they are usually from rural places. They have a lot of needs, such as food and a place to stay. So, I look for various ways to help them," said John.

There were also many meaningful conversations between our members and the guests.

The second, for the second year, was a choir performance during our Christmas service. The choir singing familiar Christmas tunes edified our congregation members and entertained our guests.







The year also saw a change to our Growth Group structure; we now have a women's group, another group that meets on Friday evening, and University-College Fellowship on Saturday afternoon before our service at 5pm. We were also able to realise our plan for starting a men's group on Saturday afternoons. More of our members have committed to attend Growth Groups regularly.

We were excited to have Christopher and Christina join us as apprentices. They are siblings who grew up in Muar and have zealous hearts to serve the church. Christopher took charge of the University-College Fellowship strengthen it and help it grow. Christina looks after and supports younger women in our congregation. They are a blessing to me as a pastor. also help with They events, organisational tasks, and administrative works.

Women's Bible Study

Come rain or shine on a Saturday afternoon, a group of women can be found in an air-conditioned room engrossed in a discussion about the Bible.

Women's Bible study is one of the four Bible study groups in Wang Dao Tang (the Mandarin congregation). They gather every Saturday at 2:30pm to study a Bible passage before service starts later in the evening. The main aim of the group is to create a supportive group of Christian women and nurture them in God's word.

In 2023, women's Bible study met a total of 40 times. Each session starts with a song of praise, followed by Bible study, and ends with prayer for one another. Throughout the session, there are snacks shared and jokes cracked.

Each study is structured with thoughtful questions and members are prompted to understand the passage within God's salvation plan and reflect on its application in their lives. The closing prayer session provides a space for members to share their struggles and pray together.

Women's Bible study helps women in the congregation grow closer and foster community in a smaller group. Activities are hosted once every few months for better fellowship.







The group met three times for fellowship in 2023:

The first was a Chinese New Year gathering in two different homes to eat together, have a good time of fellowship, and get to know each other better. The second was meeting up in a cafe before Bible study for nice coffee and pastries and a fun photo session. Finally, Mid-autumn festival celebration, where the group had lunch together at a Yong Tau Foo restaurant and continued for round two at a dessert cafe. It was an opportunity for members to bring non-Christian friends to join the meetup and the service afterwards.



I get to learn Scripture in depth with more women's Bible study. It prepares me very well for the afterwards, sermon and understand the sermon better. The women in the group have also helped me have a more Biblical mindset to face different challenges in my life. I am thankful to grow in Christ together with other sisters in the group."

Nepali

The Nepali ministry in our Cathedral began about twenty years ago. Our Sunday service used to be held in Puchong until our relocation to Shah Alam Seksyen 15 in May 2022. This is a strategic location as it's located close to factories, and many foreigners, including Nepalese, stay nearby.

After our move, five brothers and sisters from Puchong continued to attend services in Shah Alam with us. We started with an average attendance of 10.

In September 2022, one of the brothers requested for a Saturday service as he and his friends work on Sunday. Soon after in October, we began a Saturday evening service with this brother and his friends. After attending a few services, another one of our brothers, Yugal, accepted Christ!

Last year, we had new brothers join us for our Sunday service, bringing our average attendance to 15. Sadly, more than half of them were transferred to other places or had to return to Nepal after the end of their work contracts. By the end of the year, the average attendance at our Sunday service was 5 while the Saturday service had grown to an average of 13.

It's one of the main challenges of our ministry, that new brothers and sisters join us every two to three years, but due to work shifts, completed contracts or transfer, would not be able to attend our service for the long term. Even so, we continue to praise God for bringing many Nepalese to worship Him through our ministry.

One of the ways we continue to reach out to them is by sharing gospel tracts in Shah Alam nearby our church, once or twice a month. Many Nepalese in this area are Hindu and are not keen to hear the gospel. Even so we continue to trust God and His timing of intervention, even when only a small percentage of them respond to our sharing. Participants of Engage KL (an annual event for university students overseas) also encourage our members when they visit the hostels and distribute tracts together.





We also believe that God's grace and mercy are upon these migrant workers for them to know Him, to be equipped while they are here and to return to Nepal as His witnesses.

For this reason, we hold evangelistic events in church on major festivals like Deepavali and Christmas, where we would host fellowship over food and share a special message.

On a long break on festival days, we will organise our annual church camp at Port Dickson for a time of learning and fun together. For many of our members, it is their first seaside experience! Bible studies, topical discussions, and trainings are also conducted on Sundays. These times together are crucial to equip and prepare them before they return to Nepal.

The most challenging aspect of ministry is having to preach, teach, train and equip with no other leadership support due to language constraints. However, God has blessed me with Yvonne, a servant-hearted wife, who is also my ministry partner. I am also thankful for the support of the St Mary's pastoral team and congregation for their generous support for the Nepalese ministry in financing and many other ways. We rejoice because God's love is manifested through them to make this ministry possible.

Despite our challenges, God is graciously gathering Christians and growing our numbers, whether in Shah Alam or in Nepal. As we continue to reach out to unbelievers by sharing the gospel, we trust that God will bless our work and effort. We are grateful to God for His amazing grace and love through Jesus Christ All glory and honour to Him alone.



Finances

The heart of what we do at the Cathedral is to glorify God together, in response to His grace, by making disciples of Jesus Christ We are thankful to God for His work among us as we carried out this mission last year, and we look forward to another year of sharing the wonderful news of Jesus as our Saviour and Lord to those who do not yet know Him, to grow in knowledge of His Word, and to strengthen the fellowship that we have with each other, that we may grow towards maturity in Christ



Last year, through your pledges and donations, we collected RM2,468,896 which was RM153,046 short of our budget.

This year, due to increased needs in both the Ministry Workers Fund and General Fund, we estimate needing RM3.2 million.

The following section explains how our collections are allocated, and how your giving supports our ministries to the glory of God.






Understanding the Funds

General Fund

Our provisional budget for the 2024 General Fund is RM1.7 million to cover the costs of daily operations and upkeep of our Cathedral building.



- As part of the Anglican Diocese of West Malaysia, our Diocesan Contribution funds diocesan expenses towards other churches and ministries across Peninsular Malaysia.
- Admin Salary is for our dedicated administrative team who is tasked with managing our finances, records, communications, and operations.
- Evangelistic events, community meals, annual camp, and other ministry resources are covered by Various Ministry Expenses.
- Our Cathedral is a heritage building and requires special care. Facilities and Utilities tracks funds available towards this task.
- All our services and ministry programmes involve Other Admin Expenses including printing, audit, and banking charges.

Facilities and Utilities

We thank God for this wonderful heritage building in the centre of the city that we can gather in weekly. Maintaining this historical building requires regular maintenance and occasional projects to repair and upgrade the building.

Some of the projects undertaken in 2023 and early 2024 include:

- Pastoral offices repair and upgrade
- Installation of new WiFi system
- Fencing repair and roads resurfacing
- Air conditioners repair and replacement
- Wall paintings and light fittings at various locations
- Ceiling and leaks repair
- Kitchen remodelling
- Pipe organ servicing.

We are thankful that we have been able to proceed with these major projects, having been blessed with financial contributions from two grants, donations from the church community, and an individual benefactor.

Looking ahead, we aim to complete ongoing projects and embark on new ones. These include repairing the fountain, refurbishing toilets, and painting external walls in the newer section of the Cathedral. However, the major concern will be repairing the roof trusses in the heritage Cathedral to enable us to open the church safely. This is expected to be an expensive task requiring further significant grants and donations as the General Fund does not provide for major maintenance and repairs.

Would you prayerfully consider your financial contribution towards this fund if you are able? We would also appreciate your time and contribution if you have the skills or technical expertise that may be of use in this area.

As a church community, let's recognise our role in maintaining the building and equipment that facilitates our gathering and ministry.


